Friends of the Loxahatchee River: On May 1st, the River Center welcomed Angela Tringali, PhD, of Florida Fish and Wildlife Commission. Dr. Tringali gave a captivating presentation on the biology, ecology, and behavior of the Florida Scrub Jay. She also discussed her research into the role of UV coloration in the scrub jay juveniles. Over sixty participants attended this program.

Special Programs

Ladies Night Out – The River Center hosted our first "Ladies Night Out: Paint Party!" on April 2nd, led by the

fabulous Native Nut Meg! The evening was filled with plenty of laughs, delicious appetizers, and beautiful (and functional) works of art. We are already looking forward to having Megan back for another fun night.

Lionfish Clinic – On April 24th, the River Center hosted a Lionfish Clinic in conjunction with the 5th Martin County Annual Lionfish Round-Up to be held on Saturday, May 30th. Over 40 participants joined us for an evening

of education about this fascinating invasive species. Representatives from Florida Fish and Wildlife Commission, Department of Environmental Protection, and Martin County Artificial Reef Fund were available to answer questions and provide guidance to the prospective lionfish harvesters. The following morning, the participants were able to go on a dive trip with Scuba Works, or a kayaking trip with the River Center, to explore the waters and test their skills hunting lionfish.

Earth Day Storytime - the River Center celebrated an early Earth Day on April 9th with a special Story Time. Over 40 child and parents listened to stories and songs about helping the earth and what it means to be green. We learned about taking care of animals, people, and places that we care about and love. Participants created recycle and reusable craft projects and played recycling games. It is always a fun time to dance, sing, and hold some River Center critters.





Girl Scout Eco Action (Science Behind Your Senses) – the River Center held our latest Eco-Action workshop on April 11th. Fifty seven Brownie and Daisy Girl Scouts along with their leaders earned their Brownie Senses Badge and Daisy Violet Petal. The Scouts learned the Science Behind your Senses by comparing both human and animal senses and how each helps us to survive. The girls played games

with their just their ears and noses as well as learned the challenges of not being able to see. "Be a Sister to Every Girl Scout" was an additional theme for the day. Girls all around the world have different backgrounds, abilities, religions, and cultures but we all share many of the same values and life experiences. Girls learned to embrace their differences and appreciate how we are all sisters together. The River Center's Girl Scout Eco-Action has been providing badge and workshop

opportunities since 2009 educating over 700 girls in our community. Special thanks to Laura Kerr, the volunteers from the Society of Women Engineers, Florida Atlantic University, and the ERM Foundation for their support and dedication.

Fish Dissection Lab - On April 30th students from the Parents Educating Children Homeschool Coop came to the River Center for a very special education field trip. The high school students learned about fish anatomy, morphology, and behavior and participated in a fish dissection. Fresh snappers, bonita, and even a dolphin fish were provided by Mike Feldman, Jim "the karma guy", and Tommy Schulz of Fishing Headquarters.





After the dissection students learned how to filet fish and they all got some to take some home for a delicious meal! Students also enjoyed a seine and dip netting program at Coral Cove Park. They found conchs, a cushion sea star, and various juvenile fish species including scorpion fish, parrot fish, juvenile hog fish, school master snappers, and even a seahorse.

Indian River State College – Thirty six students from Indian River State College came for a tour of the River Center on April 8th. Professor McFee brings her Marine Biology class to the River Center every semester to learn about the Loxahatchee River Watershed, the Indian River Lagoon, plant and animal identification, and how ecosystems connect along the entire watershed. These students bring in a different perspective than our usual grade school students and we thank Ms. McFee for allowing us the opportunity to reach these young adults.

Wild and Scenic Film Festival – River Center staff participated in the Jupiter Inlet Lighthouse and Museum's first annual Wild and Scenic Film Festival on April 10th. A composition of short films was presented to a crowd of over three hundred like-minded environmental enthusiasts. Loxahatchee River Center to host "Lionfish Clinic & Hunt"

Martin County's Lionfish Program in conjunction with the MCAC Reef Fund, will host a Lionfish Clinic & Hunt, on April 24th & 25th. Day one will be geared towards education and why this species is a threat to our fragile ecosystem. On day two of the event, folks will have the opportunity to go on a Lionfish Hunt. This event will "kick off" a month long focus on Lionfish and will conclude with the 5th Annual Lionfish Round-Up on May 29th and 30th.

"It looks like the Lionfish are here to stay," says Kathy Fitzpatrick, Martin County's Coastal Engineer. "Education and eradication efforts are currently the best defense we have against this species. We started this effort in 2011, when we became aware that this problem species is in our own front yard. Empowering our local users on the need to remove these fish is our best defense today."

The Clinic is designed for all age groups. There will be educational activities for the kids and for the adults, a more sophisticated education series including how to use gear, handle the fish from capture to filet, and how to prepare them to serve to family and friends. There will also be a Lionfish Tasting, arts & craft vendors and marine education exhibits. Folks can then decide if they want to go out and hunt these fish. We will be targeting both inshore and offshore sites. Participants can venture out on their own or participate in one of our kayak, paddle board, offshore dive boats or free dive outings from the shoreline. New Gear for 2015

Like cars, boats, fishing gear, camping, etc...the hunting and shooting industry every year has its annual trade show highlighting all the new guns, knives, optics, flashlights, backpacks and everything in between. This year was no different and there is a lot of new gear out there.

Some of the highlights this year come from firearms and ammo, as they usually do. There is always another firearm for the safe or that new high tech ammo to use in it.

Mossberg this year has come out with a line of new rifles called the Patriot Series. They have about 50 different configurations in about 11 calibers to choose from. Prices start between \$399 up to \$599. Some guys think they need that \$1000.00 rifle to chase pigs or deer, but the fact is today the firearms are so well built the average hunter would be fine with one of these, and the deer or piggy will not know the difference. The general rule is you should spend more on the optic then the rifle.

We shotgun guys have one of the best hitting the market this year in the Benelli 828U. It's one of the most advanced designs out there, and it's an over and under style. The newly designed recoil reduction system and adjustable stock, along with other features made this one of the most interesting firearms this year. Available in 12gauge with either a 26 or 28 inch bbl. Pricey though at \$2499.99.

Handgun guys have the introduction of the Glock long slide MOS models. The MOS will let you put a variety of optics on the rail without needing a custom cut to be done. Calibers are 9, 40, 10mm & 45. The 10 being the most interesting one for the hunter. If you are a CWP holder and looking for a new carry pistol, Ruger has a new version of the popular LCP this year which has a better trigger pull and sight system then the previous one, which they still offer.

Hornady has a new line of ammunition out this year called Full Boar in calibers from 223 to 300, with the GMX bullet. 95% weight retention from a monolithic copper alloy bullet. It appears to be a winner in the swamps chasing those piggys.

Two of the featured films are especially significant for students.

• Phoebe's Humpback Whale Adventure takes you on a short journey of discovery with high school student Phoebe Fitz.

She teams up with scientists studying the Humpback Whales in Hawaii. She gets an eye-opening up-close and personal education about what it takes to work with these giants of the sea and shares her experience through her wonderful video.

• River Music follows a group of teenage music students who spend an entire year studying music composition and spend time on the Yuba River in California.

They learn about salmon spawning, the river's science and to deeply feel nature's own rhythm. The result is a student composed symphony of wonder-filled, soul-stirring music!

INAUGURAL EVENT

For the inaugural event, the Loxahatchee River Historical Society will present its first Outstanding Stewardship Award honoring those who have had a significant impact on our community in the areas of heritage and our natural environment.

This year's award is being given to Richard Roberts, retired Florida Park Service Biologist. Roberts was instrumental in the 1985 federal designation

of the Loxahatchee River as the first Wild & Scenic River in the state of Florida.

We are honoring him for his dedication and service to our natural environment and as an essential advisor to the Loxahatchee River Historical Society.

The WSFF will also host educational tables from neighboring environmental groups such as the River Center, Friends of Jonathan Dickinson State Park, Sierra Club, The Nature Conservancy, and Jupiter High School Environmental Research and Field Studies Academy, as well as festival sponsor tables.

The River Center, 805 N U.S. 1 in Jupiter, is offering a week-long spring break camp program for students interested in outdoor fun, sun, and exploration.

Our goal is to help each camper appreciate and understand the Loxahatchee River, take an active role in the conservation of the environment, and provide activities to increase independence, sportsmanship, and self-esteem. With four counselors and just 16 campers, kids will explore the Loxahatchee River from the freshwater cypress swamps to the ocean's beautiful reefs in a safe and personal atmosphere. Our River Center educators are lifeguard certified, providing both on and off site experiences like no other camp.

SUBJECT: CONFLICT OF INTEREST POLICY

During the 2014 legislative session, the Florida Legislature created Florida Statute 496.4055, which defines the term "conflict of interest transaction" and requires the board of directors of a charitable organization to adopt a policy regarding conflict of interest transactions.

The Friends of the Loxahatchee River, Inc. is a non-profit 501(c)(3) corporation with a mission to foster a sense of environmental stewardship of the Loxahatchee River's diverse watershed with quality programs, educational exhibits, and meaningful events. The Governing Board of the Friends of the Loxahatchee River, Inc., therefore, needs to adopt a conflict of interest policy.

provided Т used the sample Conflict of Interest Policy the Internal Revenue Service bv (http://www.irs.gov/instructions/i1023/ar03.html) with input from our legal counsel, auditor, and staff to develop the attached draft Conflict of Interest Policy and Conflict of Interest Certification (signature form on last page). Please review these documents and let me know if you have any questions or suggested revisions.

I recommend the following motion for your consideration and approval:

"THAT THE GOVERNING BOARD OF THE FRIENDS OF THE LOXAHATCHEE RIVER, INC. adopt the Conflict of Interest Policy and Conflict of Interest Certification as presented."

CONFLICT of INTEREST POLICY

Article I – Purpose

The purpose of the conflict of interest policy is to protect the Friends of the Loxahatchee River, Inc. (hereafter "Friends"), a tax-exempt organization, and its officers and directors and Interested Person (defined below), when it is contemplating entering into a transaction or arrangement that might benefit the private interest of an officer or director of the Friends or might result in a possible excess benefit transaction. This policy is intended to supplement but not replace any applicable state and federal laws governing conflict of interest applicable to nonprofit and charitable organizations.

Article II – Definitions

1. Interested Person: Any director, principal officer, or member of a committee with Governing Board delegated powers, who has a direct or indirect financial interest, as defined below, is an Interested Person.

2. Financial Interest: A person has a Financial Interest if the person has, directly or indirectly, through business, investment, or family:

a. an ownership or investment interest in any entity with which the Friends has a transaction or arrangement,

b. a compensation arrangement with the Friends or with any entity or individual with which the Friends has a transaction or arrangement, or

c. a potential ownership (which is reasonably certain and not speculative) or investment interest in, or compensation arrangement with, any entity or individual with which the Friends is negotiating a transaction or arrangement.

Compensation includes direct and indirect remuneration as well as gifts or favors that are not insubstantial.

A Financial Interest is not necessarily a conflict of interest. Under Article III, Section 2, a person who has a Financial Interest may have a conflict of interest only if the appropriate Governing Board or committee decides that a conflict of interest exists.

Article III – Procedures

1. Duty to Disclose: In connection with any actual or possible conflict of interest, an Interested Person must disclose the existence of the Financial Interest and be given the opportunity to disclose all material facts to the directors and members of committees with Governing Board delegated powers considering the proposed transaction or arrangement.

2. Determining Whether a Conflict of Interest Exists: After disclosure of the Financial Interest and all material facts, and after any discussion with the Interested Person, the Governing Board or committee shall determine if a conflict of interest exists. The Interested Person shall abstain from voting in such matters.

3. Procedures for Addressing the Conflict of Interest

a. An Interested Person may make a presentation at the Governing Board or committee meeting regarding the possible conflict of interest.

b. The Chair of the Governing Board or committee shall, if appropriate, appoint a disinterested person or committee to investigate alternatives to the proposed transaction or arrangement.

c. After exercising due diligence, the Governing Board or committee shall determine whether the Friends can obtain with reasonable efforts a more advantageous transaction or arrangement from a person or entity that would not give rise to a conflict of interest.

d. If a more advantageous transaction or arrangement is not reasonably possible under circumstances not producing a conflict of interest, the Governing Board or committee shall determine by a majority vote of the disinterested directors whether the transaction or arrangement is in the Friends' best interest, for its own benefit, and whether it is fair and reasonable. In conformity with the above determination it shall make its decision as to whether to enter into the transaction or arrangement.

4. Violations of the Conflicts of Interest Policy

a. If the Governing Board or committee has reasonable cause to believe a member has failed to disclose actual or possible conflicts of interest, it shall inform the member of the basis for such belief and afford the member an opportunity to explain the alleged failure to disclose.

b. If, after hearing the member's response and after making further investigation as warranted by the circumstances, the Governing Board or committee determines the member has failed to disclose an actual or possible conflict of interest, it shall take appropriate disciplinary and/or corrective action.

c. Upon the above determination by the Governing Board or committee in connection with an alleged violation of the Conflicts of Interest Policy, the Governing Board or committee may proceed to follow the Article III, Section 3 procedures for addressing the Conflict of Interest.

Article IV – Records of Proceedings

The minutes of the Governing Board and all committees with board delegated powers shall contain:

a. The names of the persons who disclosed or otherwise were found to have a Financial Interest in connection with an actual or possible conflict of interest, the nature of the Financial Interest, any action taken to determine whether a conflict of interest was present, and the Governing Board's or committee's decision as to whether a conflict of interest in fact existed.

b. The names of the persons who were present for discussions and votes relating to the transaction or arrangement, the nature of the discussion, and a record of any votes taken in connection with the proceedings.

Article V – Compensation

A voting member of the Governing Board who receives compensation, directly or indirectly, from the Friends for services is precluded from voting on matters pertaining to that member's compensation.

A voting member of any committee whose jurisdiction includes compensation matters and who receives compensation, directly or indirectly, from the Friends for services is precluded from voting on matters pertaining to that member's compensation.

No voting member of the Governing Board or any committee whose jurisdiction includes compensation matters and who receives compensation, directly or indirectly, from the Friends, either individually or collectively, is prohibited from providing information to the Governing Board and any committee regarding compensation.

Article VI – Annual Statements

Each Director, Principal Officer and member of a committee with governing board delegated powers shall annually sign a statement which affirms such person:

a. Has received a copy of the conflicts of interest policy,

b. Has read and understands the policy,

c. Has agreed to comply with the policy, and

d. Understands that the Friends is charitable and in order to maintain its federal tax exemption it must engage primarily in activities which accomplish one or more of its tax-exempt purposes.

Article VII – Periodic Reviews

To ensure the Friends operates in a manner consistent with charitable purposes and does not engage in activities that could jeopardize its tax-exempt status, periodic reviews shall be conducted. The periodic reviews shall, at a minimum, include the following subjects:

a. Whether compensation arrangements and benefits are reasonable, based on competent survey information, and the result of arm's length bargaining.

b. Whether partnerships, joint ventures, and arrangements with management organizations conform to reasonable standards, are properly recorded, reflect reasonable investment or payments for goods and services, further charitable purposes and do not result in private inurement, impermissible private benefit or in an excess benefit transaction.

Article VIII – Use of Outside Experts

When conducting the periodic reviews as provided for in Article VII, the Friends may, but need not, use outside experts. If outside experts are used, their use shall not relieve the Governing Board and committee of its responsibility for ensuring periodic reviews are conducted. The Governing Board and committee may reasonably rely upon the advice of outside experts in its responsibility for ensuring periodic reviews are conducted.

CONFLICT OF INTEREST CERTIFICATION

This certifies that the Friends of the Loxahatchee River has adopted a policy regarding conflict of interest transactions. The policy has been received, read and understood by all of the Directors, Officers and Trustees of the organization. Furthermore, all of the Directors, Officers and Trustees of the Friends of the Loxahatchee River agree to comply with the policy, and understand that the Friends is charitable and in order to maintain its federal tax exemption it must engage primarily in activities which accomplish one or more of its tax-exempt purposes.
